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What does a University do?

Ultimately, the University is about student learning and effective teaching, and for SNU doing so in ways that support our mission. What does this mean for our upcoming HLC visit? This week's look is at what SNU learned regarding HLC Criterion Three: Student learning and effective teaching.

HLC CRITERION THREE: Student learning and effective teaching. SNU emphasizes effective student learning and teaching. The set of key student learning outcomes is focused on university Mission Statement and General Education program goals.

Hallmarks across all SNU programs are faculty-student contact, attention to learner diversity, commitment to holistic learning, and availability of enriched learning experiences. The university is committed to providing a holistic education for students, one in which both the curriculum and cocurriculum contribute to student learning. SNU's self-study documents some key strengths in relation to learning and teaching:

Faculty and student relationships a key part of student curricular and co-curricular environments. Faculty are directly involved in all stages of the SNU educational experience, from orientation and mentoring to academic advising and learning support, co-curricular and spiritual life, and intensive study options and capstone experiences. This holds true in traditional, Professional Studies, and graduate programs. SNU seniors significantly above the national average in student-faculty interactions and supportive campus environment on the National Survey of Student Engagement

Highly qualified faculty invested in the lives of students. SNU has highly-qualified faculty: 70% of full-time SNU faculty have earned doctorate degrees and 43% hold full professor rank. Full-time faculty are very involved in providing instructional support for Professional and Graduate Studies programs as well as traditional programs. SNU provides professional development activities for both full-time and adjunct faculty. Many adjunct faculty are selected to capitalize on their professional currency and expertise.

Expanded services and facilities to meet a changing student population's needs. Over the decade, classroom spaces have been equipped to support educational technology and facilitate group and collaborative work among students. Access to library databases and other resources has increased. SNU also provides academic support services and retention initiatives to encourage student persistence and success.

Systems for assessing student learning outcomes. SNU measures and documents student learning in a variety of ways, and departments and programs review student achievement and satisfaction in order to make changes in curriculum. Student course evaluations play a part in effective classroom instruction.

5. What is the purpose of the site visit?

To assess institutional quality and the overall health of the university, and to verify the contents, tone, and conclusions about SNU presented in the Self-Study report. Team members are consultant-evaluators who will evaluate how well the university meets the criteria for accreditation, and provide advice on issues the university has identified and make recommendations on ways SNU can continue to improve.

6. How has SNU been preparing for the visit?

HLC requires a public comment period prior to the visit, which SNU has completed by posting notices in Oklahoma City and Tulsa newspapers, the SOUTHERN LIGHT, my.snu, and SNU Web site.

A weekly eForecast series was started at the beginning of the semester, focusing on how SNU meets specific HLC criteria. HLC information is also featured on the SNU Web page (www.snu.edu/hlc).

An executive summary of the Self-Study will be distributed to campus faculty, staff, board, and community groups. Information brochures will be distributed to students. Students, staff, and faculty will soon notice displays of table-tents, posters, banners in the Commons and other major campus buildings and in classrooms

Finally, there will be all-campus HLC info meetings for students (Sept. 16), staff (Sept. 22), and

faculty (Sept. 24) focusing on readiness for the site visit. All major campus committees in September will be briefed by Steering Committee members on issues of particular relevance to their areas of responsibility.

7. What will the visiting team do to prepare before coming to campus?

Before the site visit, the team will review the SNU Self-Study Report and Change Request document, SNU's Institutional Snapshot and Federal Compliance reports, the SNU Catalog and Web site, and other SNU electronic documents from the Virtual Resource Room made available in advance.

SNU has maintained continuous accreditation with The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (HLC/NCA) since1956. HLC/NCA provides institutional accreditation, which evaluates an entire university as a whole. SNU will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit on October 5-7, 2009, by a team representing HLC/NCA. The team will review the institution's ongoing ability to meet the Commission's Criteria for Accreditation.

SNU SCHOOL OF NURSING Accreditation Review: Call for Public Comment

Accreditation is a voluntary process, the purpose of which is to assess whether or not an institution or program meets particular standards, as set forth by the accrediting body. The School of Nursing at Southern Nazarene University is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), which is the autonomous accrediting are of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN). Plans are currently underway for an on-site evaluation visit, scheduled to take place November 18-20, 2009. During the visit, all three nursing programs offered by the School of Nursing will be reviewed: traditional BS with a nursing major, RN to BS completion program, and Master of Science with a nursing major. As part of the review process, major constituents (students, alumni, faculty, advisory board, employers, and the practice community) are invited to submit comments about the SNU School of Nursing to CCNE. These comments must be received by CCNE no later than Monday, October 19, 2009. Only signed comments will be accepted. Although third-party comments will be shared with members of the CCNE evaluation team prior to the on-site visit, at no time during the review process will these comments be shared with the program. If you have 12 or more hours of college course credit at SNU and you have a 3.5 or higher GPA, you can be a part of SNU's chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta, a national Honors Society for second-semester freshmen or older students. NOTE: This will be the only time students higher than second-semester freshmen level may apply. SNU is reactivating its chapter of ALD, which provided service to the community for many years through SNU students' efforts in Bethany and around the metro. Alpha Lambda Delta is a national program to promote academic excellence and servant-style leadership in college communities around the nation. College graduates who are members of Alpha Lambda Delta recognize the importance of membership in this organization, and member and non-member employers recognize your willingness to work hard and serve those around you. It is open to all students who meet criteria, regardless of whether or not you are members of the SNU Honors Program.

Here is what those of you with 12 or more hours of credit and a 3.5 GPA need to know: 1 - You pay \$25 ONE TIME and you are a member for life - even if your GPA changes, even if you do not choose to be involved in ALD organizational and service activities after your induction

2 - If you have been in New Student Institute and completed a service project there or elsewhere since your first semester, you have already completed the prerequisite service project!!

3 - Honors, Student Development, Spiritual Development, and other offices around campus continue to offer service projects where anyone can get involved, so you will have many more opportunities for service while you're here. However, ALD only requires one for membership

4 - You are eligible for ALD-only scholarships amounting to between \$1000 and \$3000 per vear!!!

5 - You can put your membership on your resume or curriculum vitae and show the world your investment in academic and service accomplishments Here is how to apply:
