We all make plans, and the university is no exception. This week's look at the accreditation process and the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) Criterion 2 of the self-study revolves around planning for the future.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

HLC CRITERION TWO: The organization's allocation of resources and its processes for evaluation and planning demonstrate its capacity to fulfill its mission, improve the quality of its education, and respond to future challenges and opportunities.

HLC expects SNU to

- prepare for the future with a realistic knowledge of trends
- use resources to support quality educational programs
- make continuous improvements through evaluating and assessing
- focus planning on accomplishing the SNU mission

SNU has a new Vision Statement in addition to an updated Mission Statement. This vision calls SNU to "be a school of choice in the South Central Region of the United States, known as one of the finest small teaching universities in the country with one of the most transformative campus experiences on earth." This Vision Statement provides the overall direction for university planning process and preparations for the future. The SNU Self-Study document highlights specific strengths related to this criterion for accreditation:

University planning processes continue to become more informed and future-focused. The reorganization of SNU's Strategic Planning Commission deliberately includes input from an environmental scanning subcommittee. SNU's November 2008 SWOT meeting illustrates trends in using relevant information contexts, focusing on long-term planning, and involving many constituencies, including trustees, faculty and staff, and students.

SNU has accomplished many unit planning goals during the last ten years. Resources have been used to support the quality of education in the areas such as technology, academic support services, and improvements to academic facilities. SNU has also made progress in updates to campus facilities and grounds, including Imel Townhouses, the Marchant Family Alumni & Welcome Center, and various facilities in the athletic complex.

Planning processes provide key linkages within the university. A shared planning focus helps units to coordinate projects. Deliberate links with the directions of the SNU mission inform the planning process, as demonstrated by several budget allocations for the 2009-10 year: online learning, global engagements, learning communities, and dormitory renovations.

In relation to this criterion, SNU is working to upgrade the institutional administrative data system to become more efficient in operations and services to students. The university is also working to strengthen recruitment and retention strategies and to develop a comprehensive plan for professional development of staff employees. Further ahead, it will be important to increase funding for technology and facilities, to attend to both fiscal soundness and quality in academics and service, and to optimize linkages between planning, budgeting, and evaluation and assessment processes.

3. What is the Higher Learning Commission (HLC)?

The Higher Learning Commission is the agency of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools responsible for accrediting colleges, universities and other institutions of higher learning. Founded in 1895, the North Central Association is one of six regional associations in the United States. The North Central region includes Arkansas, Arizona, Colorado, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma, New Mexico, South Dakota, Wisconsin, West Virginia, and Wyoming.

The Higher Learning Commission's name refers to the emphasis in higher education on accountability for student learning. The Commission's mission is to serve the common good by assuring and advancing the quality of higher learning. HLC is committed to strengthening institutional quality by developing and maintaining high standards of excellence.

4. What does the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) look for when it accredits universities?

HLC has adopted a new set of criteria for evaluation that went into effect in 2004-2005. The five new criteria areas are these:

Mission and Integrity
Preparing for the Future
Student Learning and Effective Teaching
Acquisition, Discovery and Application of Knowledge
Engagement and Service

Evaluation Visit

Southern Nazarene University (SNU) is seeking comments from the public about the University in preparation for its periodic evaluation by its regional accrediting agency. SNU has maintained continuous accreditation with The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (HLC/NCA) since1956. HLC/NCA provides institutional accreditation, which evaluates an entire university as a whole. SNU will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit on October 5-7, 2009, by a team representing HLC/NCA. The team will review the institution's ongoing ability to meet the Commission's Criteria for Accreditation.

SNU SCHOOL OF NURSING Accreditation Review: Call for Public Comment

Accreditation is a voluntary process, the purpose of which is to assess whether or not an institution or program meets particular standards, as set forth by the accrediting body. The School of Nursing at Southern Nazarene University is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), which is the autonomous accrediting are of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN). Plans are currently underway for an on-site evaluation visit, scheduled to take place November 18-20, 2009. During the visit, all three nursing programs offered by the School of Nursing will be reviewed: traditional BS with a nursing major, RN to BS completion program, and Master of Science with a nursing major. As part of the review process, major constituents (students, alumni, faculty, advisory board, employers, and the practice community) are invited to submit comments about the SNU School of Nursing to CCNE. These comments must be received by CCNE no later than Monday, October 19, 2009. Only signed comments will be accepted. Although third-party comments will be shared with members of the CCNE evaluation team prior to the on-site visit, at no time during the review process will these comments be shared with the program.

Students! Scholars! Servant leaders! If you have 12 or more hours of college course credit at SNU and you have a 3.5 or higher GPA, you can be a part of SNU's chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta, a national Honors Society for second-semester freshmen or older students. NOTE: This will be the only time students higher than second-semester freshmen level may apply. SNU is reactivating its chapter of ALD, which provided service to the community for many years through SNU students' efforts in Bethany and around the metro. Alpha Lambda Delta is a national program to promote academic excellence and servant-style leadership in college communities around the nation. College graduates who are members of Alpha Lambda Delta recognize the importance of membership in this organization, and member and non-member employers recognize your willingness to work hard and serve those around you. It is open to all students who meet criteria, regardless of whether or not you are members of the SNU Honors Program.

Here is what those of you with 12 or more hours of credit and a 3.5 GPA need to know:

- 1 You pay \$25 ONE TIME and you are a member for life even if your GPA changes, even if you do not choose to be involved in ALD organizational and service activities after your
- 2 If you have been in New Student Institute and completed a service project there or elsewhere since your first semester, you have already completed the prerequisite service
- 3 Honors, Student Development, Spiritual Development, and other offices around campus continue to offer service projects where anyone can get involved, so you will have many more opportunities for service while you're here. However, ALD only requires one for membership

- 4 You are eligible for ALD-only scholarships amounting to between \$1000 and \$3000 per year!!!
- 5 You can put your membership on your resume or curriculum vitae and show the world your investment in academic and service accomplishments

Please pick up one of each, complete the application, make a check payable to SNU for \$25, and return all to Dr. Jacobs' office by next Wednesday, Sep. 9, at 4:30 PM. Our induction and welcome ceremony will be at 4:30pm on Sunday, September 13. The ceremony will take approximately 30 minutes. You'll receive more information after Wednesday if you decide to become a member of ALD. If you want to be a member of ALD but cannot come to the ceremony, please let Dr. Jacobs know when you turn in your application and membership fee.

YOU TO CAN JOIN!! You'll just need to wait until Spring Semester so we can verify your hours and GPA. We will have a second induction, with a celebration of all Fall 2009 and Spring 2010 members, in March or April. In January we will have another call for membership.
