
Strategies of Mission Practices

Course Description: This will deal with strategy questions with which missionaries on the field grapple. These include broad questions of strategy dealt with by missionaries and also those of a more personal and family nature. The course is designed to be helpful both to those planning on actual missionary service and also to students whose future includes involvement in promoting missions vision in a local church.

Requirements

- 1. *Regular attendance*. An important component of this course is what goes on in the classroom: lectures, presentations, interaction and discussions. Absences will, therefore, result in a reduction of the course grade.
- 2. *Weekly readings*. Each week you will have about 30 pages of a textbook to read. In addition, each week you need to read "something on missions" from someplace else: a journal, a magazine, an internet site, or even a missionary's prayer letter. You will report and react to this text and "something else" reading via an online discussion group. Details on how that will be done will be given in class.
- 3. *A paper on a Strategy of Missions topic or else an in-depth study of a particular mission field or area.* The paper may include: The case for (your chosen topic), some historical background, effective implementation of this strategy, a look into the future, etc. For a paper on a given mission field and the work going on there, you should give some historical background as well as the current situation and a substantive analysis of the strategies used in evangelism and church planting.

The paper should include a bibliography of sources consulted. Attribution of quotes and other material needing documentation should follow the style given in SNU's English Composition classes.

Really impressive papers will include actual interviews with a furloughed, retired or former missionary (or missionaries).

- 4. *Summaries of videos shown in class and reactions to guest speakers*. The videos can be made up if you are absent that day.
- 5. *Exams*. Study guides will be available before exam days. Most examination material will come from the textbooks.

Among the things to be looked at will be evangelism in various cultural contexts, poverty and its alleviation, the differences between relief, rehabilitation, and development, the difference between asset-based and needs-based strategies, and the advantages of participatory over blueprint approaches.
